



"The Build" --- Stories Already Written-

The Building of the Arena has been well documented. At the time, Jerry Chapple, a charter Lion member, became the 'Lion Liaison'. Together with the area newspaper- "*The Lance*"- and its editor, Alex McAuley, Jerry attempted to....

- keep the community informed re the progress of the construction
- > explain the difficulties (and there were many)
- solicit over and over again the support of the community
- thank and give credit for all donations by way of "The "Lance List" which outlined \$ amounts, labour or equipment
- > appeal to minds and hearts of the community
- And –yes---at times to beg and plead for just a few more pennies and hands and bulldozers and trucks...

His biweekly updates in *The Lance* usually started off with--("Well, here we are again..")

Jerry wrote a full summary entitled "**The Build**" which was published in *The Lance* in later years. George Allen reprinted this story in his **Chapters** book on Sports. (George's masterful book can also be viewed in its entirely on the SSH website) Recently, Frank Archer wrote a summary of the Arena build for the SSH website using Jerry's work as a starting point and extending the "Arena Story" to include later years.

What follows here is a detailed <u>timeline</u> of events from the perspective of the **Elmvale District Lions Club** as outlined in *The Elmvale Lance*.

Timeline Begins

1950

Jan 19,1950- Motion passed by Agricultural Society deeding to Flos Township a portion of land

March 9, 1950- Logs cut on Con # 7 are donated to Lions for use in building

Mar 11,1950- Plans being drawn for approval of Government. Copeland family offers timbers from barn-Planing Mill dresses them

Mar 23,1950 Con #7 logs transferred to Copeland's Mill and are transformed into lumber.

April 14,1950 Lions Club president Frank Roberts formally announces the aim of-----

"4 Walls and a Roof by Fall"

April 20,1950 Full page outline in *The Lance*.

To Start Rink Wall Footings At Park Site

At a rink committee meeting held last Tuesday evening, it was decided to commence excavations at the fair grounds just as soon as the frost was out of the ground. At the ppresent time, there are still four to five inches in the ground.

The advertising chairman was instructed to proceed with his campaign at the earliest possible moment.

Final plans of the arena were approved and the finishing touches are being applied now,

Ross Bertram was the unanimous choice of the committee to oversee the construction. He has had extensive experience over a period of years in rink erection, and is well qualified for this particular job. He will supply power tools and hoisting equipment. We stress at this time that only four walls and the roof will be erected this year, the frills can come later.

The site for the Arena lies just inside the main gates of the fair grounds.

Lions Club Open Letter Reveals Interesting Facts on Proposed Rink

We list some of the details that are most likely to interest you: SITE---

The Agricultural Fair grounds in Elmvale. Land deeded to Flos Township and Arena to be managed by a board composed of:--Two members of Flos Township Council, two members of the Elmval: Village Council, two members of the Elmvale District Lions Club and representatives from any other organization concerned in its erection. The deed from the Agricultural Society specifies that the building will always be available for the Fall Fairs. In addition this building will be available for other functions that will require a covered area.

TYPE OF BUILDING-

The walls are to be of cement block, with a wood trues roof and metal clad.

COST-

This size and type of building, erected by a contractor, would no doubt, come close to \$50,000. However, no contractor is going to erect this building. We, with your help, and the services of a few craftsmen, under competent supervison, are going to build it. With donated materials, all materials other than donated materials are being provided at cost, and voluntary labour, the cost of this building can be decreased by a large amount. Also, at this time, it is planned to erect only four walls and the roof. The rest can come at some future date.

We would like to make it clear at this time, that all money collected on this drive, go directly into the Arena Committee's hands for the sole purpose of erection of this Community Memorial Arena. All official receipts may be used for income tax exemptions.

The government grant of \$5,000 will be available on the expenditure of \$15,000, in cash and labour.

We ask that you give serious consideration to this project. This needs your dollars, won't you help?

By this list it is very apparent that every member of the Lions Club has a job[®] to do. Some of them have two or three. Each chairman has been selected for his particular ability and knowledge.

The Arena Committee itself consists of Fred Morrissey, chairman; Milt Trace. Rog Bertram, Charlie Shaw and Jerry Chaple Thus each member of the main committee controls a sub-committee. There should be a minimum of over-lapping and with this set-up each man has his own

Aim for 4 Walls And Roof by Fall ---Lions President

There is a great need for an arena in this Community. It has been mooted several times but for one reason or another has not been carried through to a conclusion. It seems to me to be unfair to our children that they must travel many miles from Elmvale to participate in organized hockey games due to the lack of covered ice in our village. The Lions Club of Elmvale are solidly behind this project. Invitation to public to come visit the site Over 3000 blocks made so far Footings almost done



"Stage One" of the Donation canvass is reported in Lance newspaper-A list of workers as well-- Some workers were not able to be named because they were—"not able to recognize them through the motor"





Lions Arena Committee- Three Years In Charge





To Ross Bertram, the designer of the Arena roof for his exactitude, and by that we mean, that for the third time, a truss settled neatly down on two sets of bolt holes, 110 feet apart. Doesn't sound like very much, does it, but a quarter of an inch, one way or the other, would have been catastrophe.

The Elmvale District Lions Club

For whatever the reason its inception may have been, The Elmvale District Lions Club was chartered on May 1949 and the building of a Rink was announced as a major project by the Spring of 1950.

This building became a commitment of the Elmvale District Lions; part of its 'being' until it could be handed over to a higher authority some 45 year later; to Springwater Township.

The Arena was never just a building. Indeed, it became a "Committee of the Lions Club". It became the centre of Sports in Elmvale and District. It fostered and spawned other sports in which the youth of the District participated and enjoyed and grew.
